Evans Mountain

As you enter our camp lane, you can see a mountain in the backdrop. Our camp is nestled at its base. A topographical map of the area tells us that this is Evans Mountain: elevation 1,232 feet. Not a very high mountain, but nonetheless, a significant mountain.

Throughout history, mountains have served as landmarks. Both geographical and spiritual.

In Exodus 3, when God called Moses to his lifework as a leader, he was in the back of the desert at Horeb, the mountain of God. When Moses told God how overwhelming this calling was, God told him that the sign of His presence would be his serving God on "this mountain".

Fascinating. It's as if, as He's talking, God is nodding over his shoulder to Mount Horeb.

Long later Moses returns. He's now leading a multitude. He looks across the desert, and on the far horizon, he can see the mountain. A geographical waypoint for the traveler.

They near the mountain. Now, amid the noise and tumult of the multitude, when Moses looks at this mountain, surely, it's a reminder in his heart of the day when it was just him and God alone in this awesome place. A spiritual waypoint in the journey of his life.

What kind of landmark is Evans Mountain?

From a fire tower north of here it is noteworthy that, geographically, while looking south, this mountain is the first one in a range that lies beyond it.

We have found evidence that long before we set up camp here, the Native Americans did the same. I believe this mountain was a landmark along their travel routes. They climbed to the crags along its rim and watched the eagles soar. They fished the Saint Francis River below. They drew water from the streams. They sat beside their campfires, shaping new spear points, planning new hunts, and telling tales of hunts from the past. Their children roamed what now is our camp, laughing and playing. All this and much more under the constant watch of this mountain.

In more recent history, it received the name that it now carries. Local history records show the presence of an Evans family, so it seems to be named after a family rather than an individual.

Is it a spiritual landmark? When Allegany Boys Camp was established, Brian Martin, the camp director, had a theme as he told others about the work of Camp. From a scene in Psalm 73, he would explain that we were establishing a sanctuary. His words were true. To many boys and families, the camp became a sanctuary.



It is the same here at this camp. We're establishing a sanctuary. A boy's world. A place like home. When I look at our property map and see that little summit of Evans Mountain reaching toward the sky, I see it as a monument of the plans that God has had all along for this place to become a sanctuary.

And maybe, in some way, what is experienced here can reflect these beautiful verses from Isaiah:

Now it shall come to pass in the latter days That the mountain of the Lord's house Shall be established on the top of the mountains, And shall be exalted above the hills; And all nations shall flow to it.

Many people shall come and say, "Come, and let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; He will teach us His ways, And we shall walk in His paths."
